# The Flax of Dream: Some Bibliographical Notes John Homan

Following the bibliographical notes and listing for *Tarka the Otter* that appeared in Journal No. 16, I have been asked to contribute a similar item on the quartet of novels known collectively as *The Flax of Dream*, for this 'special' issue.

I make no claim to this being the definitive listing; there may well be reprints of which I am unaware. (If you own or know of any such item perhaps you would let me know?)

After some hesitation I have included *The Star Born* as historically it has always been associated as a coda, or, as Henry Williamson called it, a pendant to the novels.

As with *Tarka the Otter*, the collation is given as a single entry in arabic numbering. All leaves are reckoned, recto and verso, from the half-title, whether blank or with arabic or arabic and Roman numbering, to the verso of the last leaf printed or blank, ending the text, or as a colophon, index, etc. Free endpapers, because publisher's reckoning is not uniform may, or may not be included. However this may be determined by checking the numbered prelims, or page number on which the text begins. Whichever is applicable pre the text will apply to similar papers following the text.

The heading references used, e.g. A1 etc. are not random. In a full bibliography the letter A = all books of original work published by Henry Williamson, numbered chronologically.

The edition is said to have comprised 600 copies. Published October 1922. Contains a 6-page "Epistle Apological to Mr Dakers" (an open letter to his literary agent) and an "Addenda", neither of which were subsequently reprinted, this being the only edition in this original form.

The edition is said to have been 10,000 copies and was published in March 1936.

The spur for this one-volume edition seems to have been the visit to Nazi Germany in the autumn of 1935, with Williamson's friend, John Heygate. There he saw, in some measure, a revival of spirit along the lines his novel sequence had sought to produce after the Great War. This is referred to in the Foreword which included the now notorious tribute to Hitler. The texts for all four books were slightly revised for this 'definitive' edition. The edition finally sold out in 1945.

Due to the flimsy nature of the paper used for this collected edition Faber were unable to reproduce this text for subsequent editions (although it *was* used by Penguin for their editions of Books 1 and 2). Consequently all post-1936 individual editions issued by Faber have used the last revised text (see individual entries) issued before 1936.
