In his obituary notice of Jeffery Hamm, Peter Robins speaks of Sir Oswald Mosley's 'disastrous' attempt to win the North Kensington constituency in the general election of 1959. As well as disastrous it seemed at the time almost inexplicable; for Mosley had been nursing the constituency, where he was enormously popular — except among his professionally organised opponents — for many months.

At the time there was a strong suspicion of foul play. Not long before the election a bill sponsored by the Government was passed by the House of Commons doing away with the obligation of providing a police escort for ballot boxes being moved from polling stations to the place of count.

It seems highly probable that the North Kensington ballot boxes were tampered with during this transfer; or perhaps other boxes were substituted for them.

After the election Mosley petitioned for a recount of the ballot papers, which had been stored, in their boxes, in the Victoria Tower of the Palace of Westminster. Unfortunately the petition was rejected, as having been made a day or two too late.
