covering the period August 1926 to late 1928

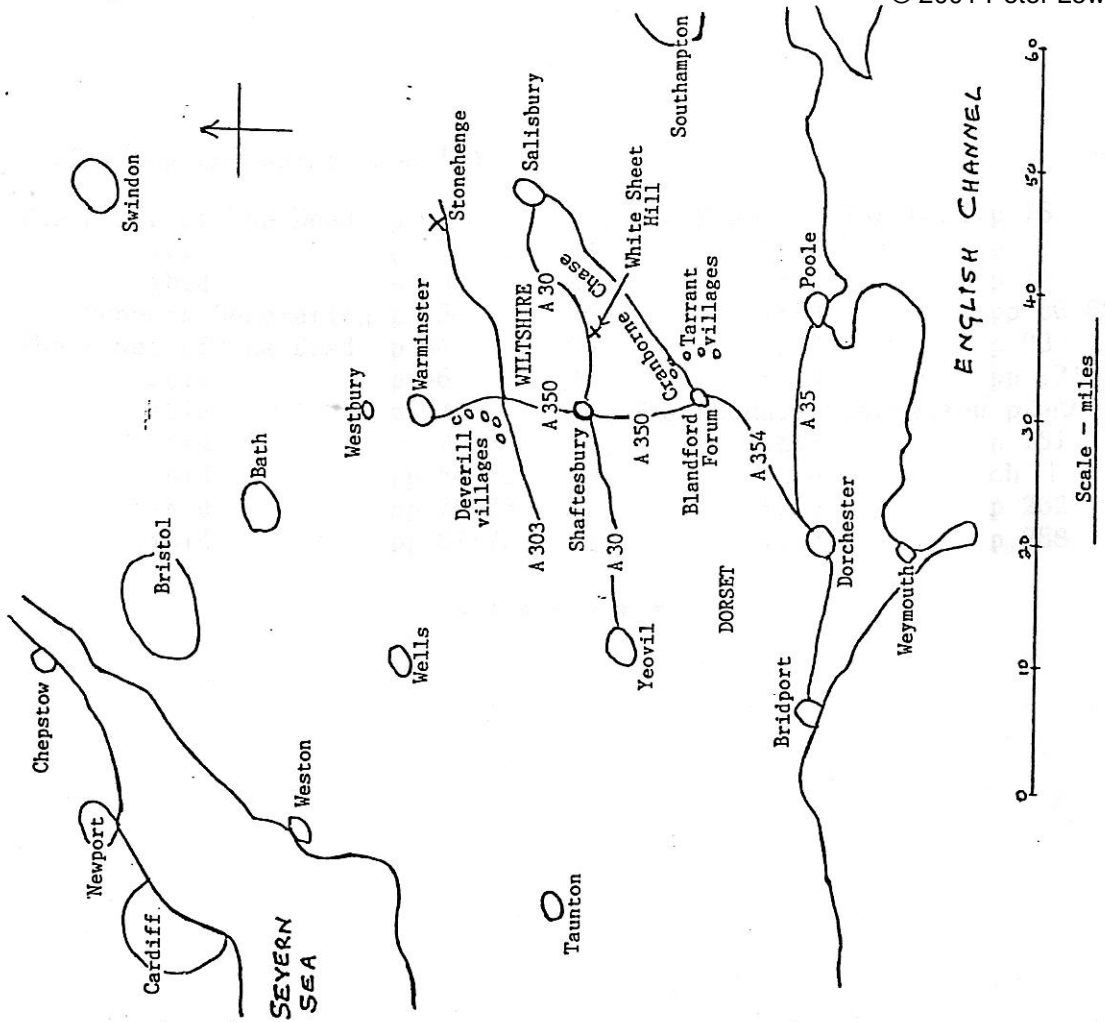

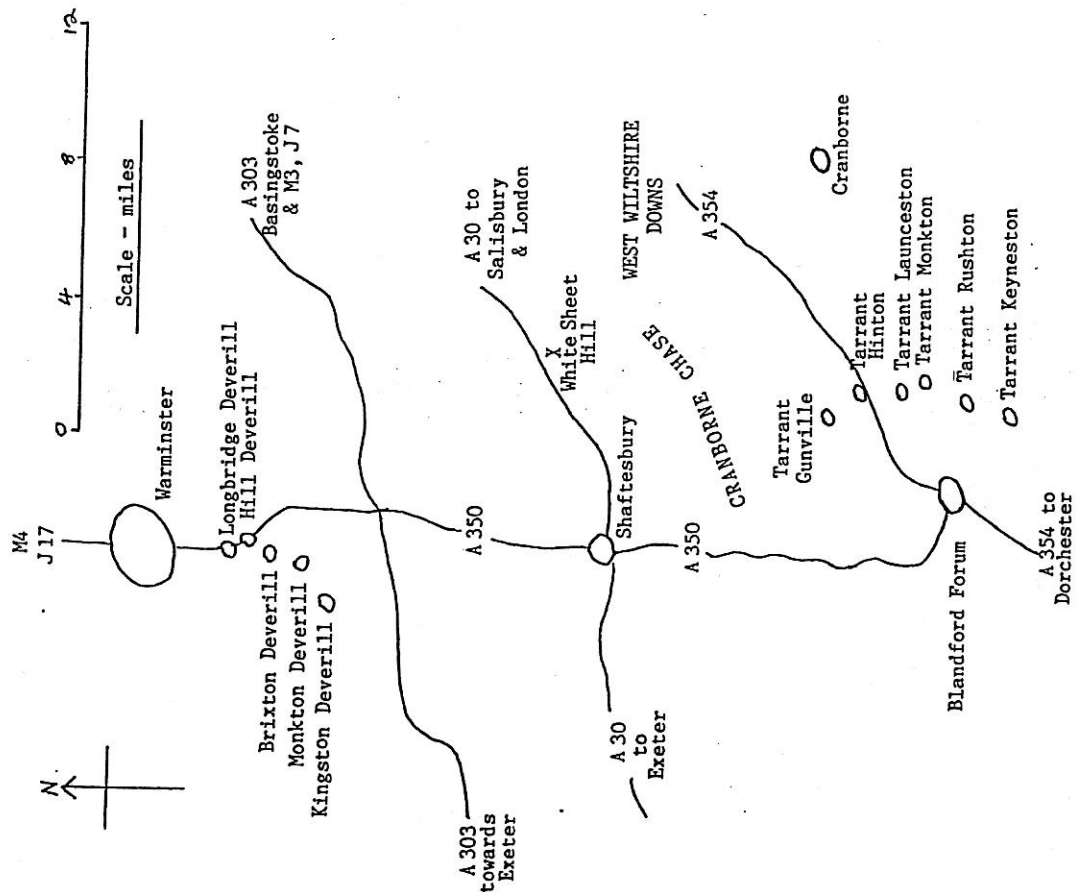

ROOKHURST village- where is it?

Well, nowhere, really, for it is entirely imaginary, but we have several clues as to where it might be.

We can be sure that it is in the West Country, at least - this is first mentioned in The Dark Lantern (1951) (pp 17, 25, 64), when Richard Maddison cycles there in the summer of 1893. We read that Richard, born at Rookhurst, of course, was born in the West Country. (p 64) But our first clue that Rookhurst might be in the West Country is when we find Phillip Maddison arriving there by rail from Paddington in a Great Western Railway train in 1912. (Dandelion Days (1922) ch 19)

Then we read later in The Dark Lantern (p 79) that Rookhurst is in chalk and flint country, so this, for example, eliminates Devon, where there is no chalk or flint, from our enquiries.

We see that Rookhurst is 60 (road) miles from Chepstow. (The Power of The Dead, p 22) (Shaftesbury is some 50 miles from Chepstow as the crow flies - see Map p 26)

Wiltshire ? (i) In The Dream of Fair Women (1924) ch 27, Willie Maddison, born at Rookhurst, tells Lionel Fairfax that he believed his forefathers had lived in Wiltshire. (ii) In It Was the Nightingale (1962) p 285, Richard dreams of retiring to his native Wiltshire. (iii) In The Pathway (1928) ch 7, Rookhurst is said to be below 'the downs' - the West Wiltshire Downs, perhaps?

Dorset. In A Solitary War (1966) p 164, we read that Richard, retired, is now living in Dorset, the county of his birth.

Stonehenge. Driving from London to Down Close at 'Shakesbury' Phillip, presumably on the main road (the A 303), passes Stonehenge (It Was the Nightingale p 306) just before journey's end.

White Sheet Hill. This prominent ridge/hill, like Stonehenge, is real enough - it looms alongside the A 30 road between Shaftesbury and Salisbury, (see Map p 26) not very far from Skirr Farm, Rookhurst - see The Power of The Dead (1963) pp 248, 264, 174.

Cranborne Chase. Another very real geological feature (see Map p 26) south of Rookhurst and visible from Skirr Farm. (The Power of The Dead p 13) Lucy Copleston, of course, whose home is Down Close, 'Shakesbury', lives in Dorset, on the edge of Cranborne Chase, not far from Rookhurst/Colham, where Willie Maddison once lived. (see It Was the Nightingale pp 130 & 181) Cranborne Chase is within walking distance of Rookhurst. (see The Power of The Dead p 200) Shaftesbury. 'Shakesbury' is drawn from this real town in north Dorset, just west of the Dorset/Wiltshire border (says Wheatley-Blench in Journal 37 p and we do not lightly disagree with that gentleman!), or at least its name

and location is, for 'Shakesbury' has a railway station (It Was the Nightingale p 234 and The Power of The Dead p 205), for instance, which Shaftesbury, perched high on its hill-top, never has, as far as I can discover. 'Shakesbury', very near Rookhurst, is in Dorset, of course, (e.g. It Was the Nightingale p 120, on which page, incidentally, 'Shakesbury' is first mentioned in the Chronicle, as late as 1925 in the fiction, the novel being published in 1962). And if Phillip's guess that Exeter is about 50 miles from 'Shakesbury' is correct (see The Power of The Dead p 67) then 'Shakesbury' would appear to be at least ten miles west of Shaftesbury.

Westbury. When Phillip, cousin Willie and Julian Warbeck travel by train from Paddington to Exeter and beyond, in 1923, Willie gets off at Westbury (see Map p26) to get the slow train to Colham to collect his dog from Rookhurst. (The Innocent Moon (1961) p 341) Colham, well known to us, is of course wholly fictional, its exact location, unfortunately, never given. But Westbury, at least, is real enough, and would appear to be the nearest main-line station to Rookhurst.

The Tarrants is a group of hamlets just east of Blandford Forum (see Map p26) and south of Rookhurst, says Richard Maddison in The Phoenix Generation (1965) p 128.

The Deverills is another group of hamlets south of Warminster (see Map p26) - the Deverills are north of Rookhurst, says Richard (same page).

Blandford Forum - sounds vaguely Latin; whether it has a 'Roman' history, I do not know. It is some ten miles south of Shaftesbury. Perhaps its name may have inspired the name of the fictional 'Flumen Monachorum' which is 18 miles south of Rookhurst on the 'Shakesbury/Colham' road, (The Phoenix Generation p 49) which doesn't help us at all, really, because we don't know where 'Colham' is. But it certainly now seems that Colham, the market town where Willie Maddison attended the grammar school, might be a lot further away from Rookhurst than the (guessed) ten miles or so covered in 15 minutes (The Beautiful Years (1921) ch 24) by the ancient and decrepit train described in Dandelion Days ch 12. 'Flumen Monachorum' (Latin, surely, Flumen = river, Monachorum, don't know) (there is, incidentally, a village called Buckland Monachorum in south Devon), about which we know nothing, is where Phillip and his family live for a while (a long while, in fact, as much as eight years), this period coinciding with Henry Williamson's sojourn in Shallowford from 1929 to 1937.

From all these clues, some of which are somewhat confusing and contradictory (there may well be others not noticed by this Sherlock), we can safely, I think, assume that 'Rookhurst' is in Dorset, in chalk country probably near Shaftesbury, within 60 road miles of Chepstow, fairly near White Sheet Hill, north of and within sight of and within walking distance of Cranborne Chase; its main-line railway station is Westbury, and it is north of the Tarrant villages, and south of the Deverill villages. (see Map p26)
